Maggie Duckworth, a 30-year-old electrical engineer from Bridgeton, was one of 200,000 applicants to become part of Mars One, a Dutch nonprofit, which will send citizen astronauts on a one-way mission to the Red Planet by 2024. In February Maggie discovered that she is one of the 100 applicants still in the running for the Mars One mission.

Raised on a farm in the heart of the country, Maggie Duckworth's first word was "home" while pointing up at the stars. Although Maggie graduated cum laude with a degree in electrical engineering, she put her technical skills into making high-end costumes and starting an international business selling the largest zippers in the world. Maggie's passion is

adventure, and her self-identified strengths are optimism, intelligence, and creativity.

Maggie's interests include physics, chemistry, math, technology, music/frequency analysis, electromagnetics, robotics, drawing, writing, acting, singing, percussion, clothing/costume design and construction, cooking, camping, travelling, kendo, Transformers, Star Wars, Star Trek, Mass Effect, and Tolkien.

to AAUW. She will talk about Mars One and their innovative plans for colonizing Mars. She will also talk about women in space and how to encourage more women in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM). Here are a few highlights.

April 15—Online voting begins (at www.aauw.org/resource/national-election; you will need your member number and voter PIN from your *Outlook*)

May 26—Date by which paper ballot must be postmarked

June 19—Online voting ends

Some of the proposed bylaws changes:

- Eliminate the degree requirement for membership
- Change the titles of AAUW's national elected leadership from president and vice president to board chair and board vice chair
- Change the title of AAUW's salaried administrator from executive director to chief executive officer

Some of the proposed public policy program changes:

- Add the term "sexual assault" to harassment and bullying
- Add the term "open and fair elections"
- Add the term "cultural diversity and inclusion"
- Remove the term "committed to the arts and humanities"
