THE SUPPRESSION OF THE RIGHT TO VOTE

Attacks on voting rights are increasing. In Missouri efforts to restrict voting include the requirement to have a pictorial voter ID and legislative efforts to set limits on the ballot initiative process.

Come hear from Sara Baker, legislative and policy director for the ACLU of Missouri, about current efforts to suppress votes and how her office is fighting to protect everyone's voting rights.



Sara Baker is responsible for working with elected officials and community organizations on issues related to the rights of all Missourians. She is returning to her home state after serving as special projects manager and Stephen M. Rivers Memorial fellow at the Center for Democracy in the Americas in Washington D.C.

While at the Center for Democracy in the Americas, Sara provided research on the role of women in Cuba's

evolving economy and worked directly with high-level congressional delegations to the island. Her thesis, "Alternative Futures for the Civil Military Relationship in a Post-Castro Cuba," was published on the director of National Intelligence's Virtual Americas Network, widely circulated in the White House, and led to an opportunity for Sara to brief the deputy assistant secretary of defense for western hemisphere affairs.

Prior to her time in D.C., Sara instructed and organized students in the Global Citizenship Program at Washington University in St. Louis. At Wash U, she served as a policy fellow for the <u>American Association of University Women</u>, where she advocated for legislation to curb sexual assault on campus and in favor of equal pay. Outside of academia, Sara worked with the International Institute in Saint Louis to resettle refugees and help them access state and federal benefits.

Sara holds a Bachelor of Arts in International and Area Studies and Spanish, and a Master of Arts in International Affairs, both from Washington University in St. Louis.

(2020 International Relations Lecture Series - continued)

International Expert on Climate Change <u>Dr. Thomas E. Lovejoy</u> will lecture on the Triple Threat of Global Warming: Ecological, Environmental, and Humanitarian Crises.

Dr. Lovejoy coined the term "biological diversity" and played a central role in the establishment of conservation biology as a science. He helped establish and, since the 1970s, has headed a large-scale experiment to study the effects of deforestation on the diversity of animal and plant species in the Amazon. This work has guided the planning of conservation areas in the region. Lovejoy has advised three U.S. presidents on climate change.

Currently Dr. Lovejoy is a senior fellow at the United Nations Foundation and professor at George Mason University. He will be introduced by Dr. Peter H. Raven, eminent botanist and former director of the Missouri Botanical Gardens.

Joseph Scherrer is Washington University in St. Louis' executive director of the Henry Edwin Sever Institute, director of the Cyber Security Strategic Initiative, and program director of graduate studies in Information Systems Management & Cyber Security Management. Following a distinguished 24-year career as a leader and IT and cyber security innovator with the U.S. Air Force, culminating as the commander of the Air Force's only combat-coded deployable communications wing, Scherrer retired as a colonel.

April 14: The New Populism: Identity Politics and the Rise of Us-Against-Them Leadership

Dr. Debra Leiter's focus is comparative politics, primarily Western Europe, and her research examines how the institutional, social, and party system contexts affect the type of information voters have access to, rely on, and use when making political decisions. Leiter joined the Department of Political Science at the University of Missouri-Kansas City in 2013. She received her B.A. from the University of California-San Diego and her Ph.D. from the University of California-Davis. She is an award-winning researcher and teacher, having received the Carrie Chapman Catt Prize on Women and Politics and the UMKC CAS Alumni Outstanding Teaching Award.
