Message from Co-President Jeanne Webdell

I have been associated with AAUW for more than 40 years. I heard about it from my Aunt Jean, who was a member of the Hannibal Branch and talked about the good they were doing. After all these years some things are better, but there is a lot more to do. The United Nations issued a report (April 9, 2020 *Policy Brief: The Impact of COVID-19 on Women*) citing the adverse effect of the virus on women economically. The report also noted the increase of violence towards women because of the stresses involved in job loss, social distancing, etc. I have included a short section of that report (see page 6). <u>You can download the complete report from</u> <u>the U.N. website</u>. The <u>New York Times published an article</u> on June 3, 2020, about the report.

MEDICAID EXPANSION VOTE

State Public Policy Chair **Pat Shores** sent this information:

"The Medicaid Expansion vote is moving faster than expected. It will be Amendment 2 on the August 4 ballot. Health Care for Missouri is the Medicaid expansion campaign for Missouri which AAUW supports.

MOVE (the Missouri Organizing and Voter Engagement Collaborates) is a coalition of grass-roots not-for-profit organizations leading a campaign for Medicaid Expansion. <u>We encourage you to vote yes</u>."

AAUW STATEMENT ON RACISM

AAUW joins the country in mourning the losses of **George Floyd**, **Ahmaud Arbery**, **Breonna Taylor** and countless other people of color who have been unjustly killed across our nation. Our country needs healing. But healing will only come with justice. As an organization, we condemn racism.

Systemic racism is firmly rooted in the U.S., and today's injustices mirror our shameful history — from police brutality to the disproportionate impact of COVID-19 on communities of color. There can be no justice or equality when Black and Brown communities are seen as less deserving of basic human and civil rights.

On behalf of our 170,000 members and supporters, we commit to fighting for justice, long-term and lasting change, and we stand in solidarity against racism. We also acknowledge that as an organization we have our own work to do.

And, as a member of the Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights, we will work to advance the policies and systemic changes identified in the <u>New</u> <u>Era of Public Safety: A Guide to Fair, Safe, and Effec-</u> <u>tive Community Policing</u> and <u>Vision for Jus-</u> <u>tice</u> platform.

In case you missed it, here is Kim Churches' letter to AAUW members:

We join the country in mourning the losses of George Floyd, Ahmaud Arbery, Breonna Taylor, and countless other people of color who have been unjustly killed across our nation. Our country needs healing, but healing will come only with racial justice.

In addition to taking care of yourself and your loved ones, today we are asking you to do three things: listen, learn, and then vote.

<u>First</u>— **listen**. Listen to the Black and Brown leaders and members of your community when they speak. Remember that many people are struggling with enormous pain and despair, so we urge self-educating instead of asking Black and Brown people to work for the benefit of your learning. *(If you need somewhere*) to start, we recommend <u>New Era of Public Safe-</u> ty: A Guide to Fair, Safe, and Effective Community <u>Policing</u> with the Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights and "<u>Racism 101" with Show-</u> ing Up for Racial Justice.) When listening, minimize questions to a simple, "Is there anything I can do to help you today?"

Second — learn. Read our <u>recent statement</u> highlighting AAUW's stand against racism and this <u>Washington Post article</u> by 2016-17 AAUW American Fellow alumnae Keisha Blain about the problematic history of policing in this country. Systemic racism is firmly rooted in the United States — from police brutality to the disproportionate impact of COVID-19 on communities of color. Then talk to your family, children, and friends. Talk to them about how today's injustices mirror our own country's shameful history. Saying "Black lives matter" is important and needed. This is an historic moment that requires your vocal support.

<u>Third</u>— vote. <u>And make sure everyone is able to</u> <u>access and exercise this important right</u>. Our democracy works when everyone can fully participate, but people of color often experience discrimination at the ballot box. With a pivotal election ahead, persuading policymakers to expand voting rights is a powerful way to support marginalized communities.

Change begins with understanding and ensuring that all are being heard.

This can be a difficult experience. But it's incumbent on all of us to do the hard work. We at AAUW also acknowledge as an organization that we have work to do. We invite you to join us in learning and supporting this work towards long-term and lasting change.

AAUW is a powerful and positive force for change — let us truly listen, learn, and <u>ensure everyone's</u> <u>voices can be heard</u>.

New Research on Women & Loan Debt

Even before coronavirus upended the global economy, the gender wage gap made it harder for women to repay their student loans. AAUW's 2020 analysis of its <u>Deeper in Debt</u> report also revealed that:

- Black women finish their undergraduate education with more debt than other women.
- First-generation college students face more debt by the time they graduate.

Women who attended for-profit colleges owe far more money than those who attended public or private non-profit schools. "[Having a female president] matters. It matters because we have half the population that has given so much to building this country, to making it work, and of course I want to see a woman in the White House. Because, if I look at my friends and former colleagues who are now in the Senate, it was the women senators on both sides of the aisle who finally broke the fever over the government shutdown and debt limit debate. They have been working across party lines, and we need more of that." —<u>Hillary Clinton</u>

UNITED NATIONS REPORTS ON THE ECONOMIC IMPACT OF CORONA VIRUS ON WOMEN

"The limited gains made in the past decades are at risk of being rolled back," concluded a U.N. report on the virus's impact on women.

From the April 9, 2020 <u>Policy Brief: The Impact of COVID-19 on Women</u> conclusion: "A pandemic amplifies and heightens all existing inequalities. These inequalities in turn shape who is affected, the severity of that impact, and our efforts at recovery. The COVID-19 pandemic and its social and economic impacts have created a global crisis un-

paralleled in the history of the United Nations—and one which requires a whole-of-society response to match its sheer scale and complexity. But this response, whether at the national or international level, will be significantly weakened if it does not factor in the ways in which inequalities have made all of us more vulnerable to the impacts of the crisis. Or, if we choose to simply repeat past policies and fail to use this moment to rebuild more equal, inclusive and resilient societies. Instead, every COVID-19 response plans, and every recovery package and budgeting of resources, needs to address the gender impacts of this pandemic. This means: (1) including women and women's organizations at the heart of the COVID-19 response; (2) transforming the inequities of unpaid care work into a new, inclusive care economy that works for everyone; and (3) designing socio-economic plans with an intentional focus on the lives and futures of women and girls. Putting women and girls at the centre (sic) of economies will fundamentally drive better and more sustainable development outcomes for all, support a more rapid recovery, and place us back on a footing to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals."
