Condolences to Nora Beiswenger's Family.

Long-time branch member **Eleanor Haven** (Hutchins) Beiswenger passed away on March 20, 2021, at home in Webster Groves after a stroke. Nora lost her first husband, John Nothstine, in 1958. Her husband, Hugo Beiswenger, died



several years ago while they were living in St. Louis. She later married John Norris; they were one of the subjects of a book on late-life marriages.

Nora was born in Detroit, MI, on June 24, 1926. She joined AAUW in 1982 and K-WG after moving here from TN. She had received an AA from Henry Ford Community College, Dearborn, Michigan, 1962; AB with honors, University of Michigan, Dearborn, 1964; MA in English, U of M, Ann Arbor, 1966; PhD in American Culture, U of M, Ann Arbor, 1969. She taught English at Clarkson College (Potsdam, NY); UT-Nashville; Austin Peay State U. (Clarksville,TN), specializing in 18th and 19th century women writers; and was vice president of Austin Peay from 1982-85 and 88-91.

In addition, Nora was a board director for Cooperative Center for Study in Britain, 1990-1994; International delegate, People to People/Citizen Ambassador Program, Russia and Lithuania, 1993. Besides AAUW, she belonged to many organizations: League of Women Voters, Jane Austen Society North America, Elizabeth Gaskell Society, George Eliot Fellowship, National Museum of Women in the Arts, National Women's Hall of Fame, Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, Phi Kappa Phi.

KWG Earns Awards at AAUW MO Annual Meeting

Kirkwood–Webster Groves Branch came away with a number of awards from the AAUW Missouri Annual Meeting held by Zoom on Saturday, May 1. Top of the list was again being named a 10-Star Branch in the Missouri Star Awards.

Branch member Marsha Koch was re-elected secretary of the state Board of Directors. KWG's generosity and support of AAUW Fund was recognized by the following awards:

- Second in the state in per-capita giving by branches to AAUW Fund with \$101.07
- Third in the state in total branch giving to AAUW Fund
- Three members recognized as Century Club Plus donors for gifts of \$250 or more: Carol Davis McDonald, Julia Muller, and Lynne Roney
- Six members recognized as Century Club donors for gifts of \$100 or more: Barbara Johnson, Marsha Koch, Deborah McWard, Mara Minarik Perry, Jeannie Webdell. Suffragist-sign purchaser Janie Foltz from the Kansas City area credited her donation to our branch.

Nancy Hutchins was recognized as an AAUW Legacy Circle member.

Branch Co-president **Jeannie Webdell** described our Incentive Grant awarded by AAUW MO. This project in 2020 provided more than 800 yard signs across the state and U.S.A. honoring suffragists and the 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment.

KWG member Lynne Roney was named AAUW MO Outstanding Member for 2020, an award chosen by a committee of the State Board. Outstanding Members for 2021 were Ellen Irons of St. Louis Branch and Sue Shineman of Independence Branch.

Missouri Woman of Distinction Awards went to **Donna Myers** of Boonville Branch (posthumous award) and **Marjorie Boudreaux** of Joplin Branch. They were presented by **Kay Meyer** in her capacity as Past President of AAUW MO.



KWG members were involved in planning and orchestrating the meeting, including Lynne Roney in her capacity as AAUW MO Program Vice President; Chris Nobbe, who handled technical features and photography; and Marsha Koch, AAUW MO Secretary.

Jeannie's Report to the State

(This report was made to the AAUW of Missouri annual conference on May 1 concerning the grant Kirkwood-Webster Groves received from the State organization.)

This was a project involving the whole branch. The pandemic forced people to give up in-person meetings and curtailed celebrations of the 100th Anniversary of Women's Right to Vote. The Kirkwood-Webster Groves Branch decided to do yard signs to remember the work of the suffragists.

The Missouri AAUW Grant allowed us the freedom to take

on this purchase of 800 signs honoring the 100th Anniversary of Women's Right to Vote without fearing we would bankrupt our branch treasury. The signs were essentially sold at our cost of \$3.00. The grant helped pay for an information



sheet explaining the project and allowed us to give some signs away to community leaders and media people as well as our Kirkwood-Webster Groves members. It also allowed us to place an advertisement thanking the suffragists and the community for their support of the project. Through our AAUW connections, signs were planted in people's yards all over Missouri. They were taken by the LWV to the Botanical Garden for the ceremony designating a yellow rose as the Suffrage Rose. The signs were at special services at cemeteries remembering suffragists and at the Missouri History Museum at the entrance to the special Suffragist Exhibit Beyond the Ballot Box (picture) Signs were shipped to AAUW people in Texas, North Dakota, South Carolina and New Mexico. Thank you Missouri AAUW for helping with this project.



The Kirkwood-Webster Groves (K-WG) Branch of AAUW was formed to meet the needs of an everincreasing population in two of the oldest communities in St. Louis County.



Many of its charter members belonged to the first AAUW branch in the St. Louis area, the St. Louis Branch, established in 1893.

The K-WG charter was granted at the Missouri State AAUW meeting in April 1971 when Miss Lillian Stupp, a former Missouri AAUW president, a member of the St. Louis Branch, and one of the K-WG charter members (Aunt Lil to Maurita, to whom she gave a membership), installed the first officers. Installed were Maurita Stueck, president; Margaret Joyce, first vice president; Roberta Sterling, treasurer; and Ella Bettinger, secretary. There were 47 members of the Branch who were listed with the honorifics of Mrs. and Miss. Many of the married women were listed with their husband's first name instead of their own given name. Some had their own name in parentheses and a few went by their given name. (Times have changed in 50 years. Today some prefer the gender neutral title of Mx.)

Do you remember (or did you know)...

When we sponsored a community program called Mother-Daughter Choices? Sixth grade girls and their mothers were provided with an opportunity to grow and learn from each other. The program, initially begun by Girls, Inc. (formerly the Girls' Club) of Santa Barbara, CA, was organized locally by Branch Member Linda Duckworth. Using a variety of thought-provoking exercises and group discussions, the program attempted to improve communication between girls and their mothers during the critical preteen years and to promote assertive and responsible behavior. Participants learned to assess career options and the economic realities they might face in the adult world, while at the same time expanding their visions of themselves and their capabilities. Beginning in 1990 with a Girl Scout troop from Webster Groves, the program brought together two to three groups of girls and their mothers every year. Approximately seventyfive girls completed the six-week program.

Hello from Hot Springs Village!

My husband and I are at our timeshare in Hot Springs Village, Arkansas, in the Ouachita Mountains. We are in the largest gated community in the U.S., encompassing 40.7 square miles (about 26,000 acres). I finally made it to an AAUW meeting here, the Hot Springs Village - Hot Springs Branch. They had their first in-person meeting today, under a pavilion at one of the lakes. Unfortunate-

ly, it was in the 50s, and it rained. This was their annual meeting for election of officers and officer reports. We started out with wine, iced tea, etc. and many delicious munchies; and we



ended with a game of Bingo, where all the squares were famous women in history.

Members were very friendly, and there was a lot of laughter (several humorous members). It was quite an enjoyable meeting, and I heard some impressive fundraising information (\$15,000+/- each year for 10 \$1,500 scholarships). Membership is down, as it is in most organizations. They have around 60-70 members, and today's meeting brought out at least 30 women despite the cold, rainy weather. I'll be on their mailing list, looking forward to hearing their ideas.

Well, back to working on this newsletter. Thank goodness for the portability of laptops.

Segregated by Design: Housing Inequality in St. Louis

St. Louis is divided along many lines, and race plays a role in every one of those divisions. It determines our future because if you make a transparent map of racial segregation and lay it over other maps – political power, cultural influence, health, wealth, education, and employment – the pattern repeats itself. Why was segregation more dramatic here in St. Louis than it was in other Midwestern cities? Why hasn't it lifted as quickly?

Judy Gladney, a longtime community activist, will speak about the impact of these policies in St. Louis.
