AS in other professions, women are under-represented and undervalued in the art world. Only a third of artists represented by commercial galleries are women, and women working in arts professions are paid on average 74 cents to every dollar paid to men. Every year AAUW of Missouri recognizes branches who align their work with the AAUW national and state strategic plans and initiatives



that foster AAUW's mission. All successes (large and small, few and many) are important for achieving AAUW's mission. There are 10 focus areas, and a star is awarded for meeting the requirements of each area. Based on our branch activities from April 1 through March 31, Kirkwood-Webster has consistently earned 10 stars. This year the state developed an Action Plan to guide branches in planning programs and activities; our board spent hours reviewing the plan and adopted it as our Action Plan. Our main goals in the four areas of action are:

- Education and Training Champion equal-access education, emphasizing STEM, and ensure education at every level is free from sex discrimination.
- Economic Security Shrink the gender pay gap and bolster inclusive career pathways for women in skills and training.
- Leadership Expand the number of women in leadership, particularly in STEM.
- Governance & Sustainability Continually improve and practice governance that emphasizes inclusion. Work to enhance our financial sustainability by increasing and diversifying revenue.

Each goal in the Action Plan offers detailed suggestions for addressing these challenges as well as meeting the requirements of the AAUW MO Star Award; we have already completed some of the tasks required in each category. AAUW has a similar award program, the Five-Star National Recognition Program; learn more about it <u>here</u>. The board is considering applying for this award. If you have been involved with AAUW for a while, you've probably heard Charlotte's name. She has done about everything in AAUW before moving here from Jefferson City, where she has been branch president for close to 20 years. When I asked her for a list of accomplishments, she came up with entrepreneur and small business owner; piano and voice teacher; licensed health insurer and independent contractor, assistant to elderly with Medicare issues; kindergarten teacher; GED teacher in the Missouri Department of Corrections at Church Farms and Tipton.

She has many stories to tell about her work at the prisons. A conclusion she came to was that a high proportion of learning disabilities exist in the prison population, no doubt because they had already experienced difficulties with traditional learning. No doubt we could spend a whole program listening to her. Her husband put it best: "Your stories from there are different from your kindergarten stories."

Charlotte holds a B.A. in Elementary Education from the University of Iowa as well as a Bachelor of Music in Vocal Performance from the University of Nebraska at Omaha. She has been a proud member of AAUW for close to 50 years.

Among the achievements she lists is being married to the same man for 52 years. We had the opportunity to meet Richard L. Parsons at the History Museum in December. They moved back to St. Louis to be closer to family. They have two grown daughters, a beautiful grandson, and a twin niece and nephew.

JULIE MOYER

What an interesting biography Julie sent for her introduction to the branch. I hope we can keep up with her. It would be pointless to change what she wrote.

"I grew up in Webster Groves and went to Loyola University in Chicago for my undergraduate degree in

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nursing. I had a lot of different interests in nursing and ended up working in public health and pediatric hospitals, and ultimately decided to pursue more education in public health. My interests were more global than local health though, so I took a big leap and attended the University of Sydney's Masters of International Public Health program. However, I was not done with Australia when my master's program was complete! I continued working in Melbourne for a couple of years and was in Australia for about four and a half years total before moving back to St. Louis. I worked in public health and clinical research locally before ending up at the Human Research Protection Office at Washington University, where I am currently employed.

I am an educator for investigators and research teams conducting human subjects research at WU. It is end-lessly interesting and gratifying.

I am an aunt to four nephews, ages 9, 8, 5 and 5. My partner Dave has two kids in the WGSD, although my heart truly belongs to my 12-ish year old beagle named Darrell (who does not have another brother Darrell). My favorite show ever is *The Mary Tyler Moore Show*, which I only watched for the first time in 2021. I love reading books with women protagonists, eating spicy foods, and figuring out how to make the world a better place with the privilege I have been afforded."

GREENWOOD CEMETERY - PART OF THE VOTES FOR WOMEN TRAIL PROJECT

The Votes for Women Trail project is underway with 31 sites already in Missouri. It is eye opening to review

some of the efforts women made over 100 years ago to obtain the right to vote for women and to work for equity for all people. Among the registered sites is **Greenwood Cem**etery located at 6571 St. Louis Avenue, Hillsdale, MO 63121. Buried there are three African American suffragists: **Mary Al-**

ice Ford Pitts, Maria L. Harrison, and Arsania Williams. Pat Shores, the coordinator of the Trail Project for AAUW MO, submitted this information about Mary Alice Ford Pitts to the history site project:

African American Suffragist Mary Alice Ford Pitts played a leading role in many St. Louis community organizations. She was an educator, a temperance worker, a club organizer, and a woman before her time. She was president of the St. Louis Colored Orphans' Home and the Harper Women's Christian Temperance Union that worked tirelessly to raise the funds to provide a safe place for orphaned black children at 1427 N. 12th Street. She helped to start the Phyllis Wheatley YWCA for women and girls of color and was a founding member of the Missouri Colored Women's Club in 1900.

Mary Alice Ford Pitts attended the National Association of Colored Women gathering in Boston as a delegate of the Women's Club, the Harper Women's Christian Temperance Union and the citizens of St. Louis. As one of the speakers at the first convention of the National Federation of Afro-American Women in Washington D.C., she said, "...we entertain every difference of opinion and belief, we are suffragists and anti-suffragist, temperance and antitemperance...women should remain undaunted in the midst of calamity and stand shoulder to shoulder, singly and together."

Greenwood Cemetery, which is 31.85 acres, is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. It is the final resting place for over 50,000 African-Americans. Herman Krueger established Greenwood Cemetery in 1874 after resigning his position as superintendent of St. Peter's Cemetery on Lucas and Hunt Road. He was able to envision the need - and potential profitability - of a private black cemetery. Greenwood was the first commercial burial ground for area African Americans.

In August of 2020, a special service was held at Greenwood Cemetery commemorating the actions of Mary Alice Ford Pitts, Maria L. Harrison, and Arsania Williams. (Other suffragists may be buried at Greenwood as well.) Speakers included AAUW MO's presi-

dent-elect **Karen B. Francis,** who coordinated the event. Also speaking were Shelley Morris, Greenwood treasurer, and Etta Daniels, Greenwood historian.

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Approximately 25 people representing AAUW, Women's Voices for Social Justice, League of Women Voters St. Louis, St. Louis Protection Coalition, National Women's Political Caucus St. Louis, and local elected officials attended the remembrance "Honoring Black Suffragists." **Marsha Koch** and **Jeanne Webdell** attended from our branch.

Christopher Lewis, **MD**, is co-director of Pediatric Transgender Health, director of Differences of Sex Development Clinic, and assistant professor of pediatric endocrinology in the Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis.

Samati Nioymchai is an HIV/AIDS case manager at Washington University. He is a licensed master social worker with more than four years' experience in case management, working with low-income populations in both emergency medicine and clinic settings, and providing intervention services for individuals experiencing domestic violence. In 2014 he was a contributor to the groundbreaking anthology *Recognize: The Voices of Bisexual Men*.

Rabbi Daniel Bogard is a co-rabbi at Central Reform Congregation--a position he shares with his spouse, Karen. A lifelong social justice advocate, he is involved in numerous causes, including advocating for undocumented persons in St. Louis and working to make the minimum wage a living wage in Missouri. He will share his personal story of advocating before the Missouri legislature on behalf of one of the couple's three young children who is transgender.

AAUW Missouri is shifting the focus of the equal pay advocates from communicating with Missouri state legislators to meeting with local city

officials about the gender pay gap.

The Equal Pay Advocates are making the change because most members of the Missouri Senate and House of Representatives have not been receptive to discussing the gender pay gap nor bringing bills to the floor. Five bills were filed last year; some were assigned to a committee, but none had a hearing. As the registered AAUW of MO lobbyist, I will continue to monitor the equal pay bills in the next session.

AAUW members established a personal relationship with local officials in 2020–2021 when we asked them to support proclamations for the 100th anniversary of women getting the vote. We want to build on that relationship with Equal Pay Advocate meetings. Information in support of equal pay for equal work for the women who work in their cities will be shared. We will also help them see that AAUW is a trusted source of information about the gender pay gap.

The Missouri Women's Network (MWN) is a coalition of groups and individuals working for equity for women. AAUW Election: Learn the Issues and Vote

As AAUW members, you have the right to comment on any proposed changes to AAUW bylaws before they are put up for a member vote this spring. Although the <u>com-</u><u>ment period</u> closed at 5 p.m. ET on February 2, 2022, you may still look at the proposed changes. Then weigh in this spring to elect members to the national board of directors and vote on amendments to bylaws.

Sex Discrimination Today Takes a Variety of Forms

Unfair pay, pregnancy discrimination, sexual harassment, sexual assault, and violations of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 can affect both women and men.

AAUW's Legal Advocacy Fund addresses these barriers by informing people of their rights and using the legal system to seek justice and change. LAF was created in 1981 by AAUW members and has provided millions of dollars to balance the scales of justice for people working toward gender equity through the legal system. We support brave plaintiffs seeking legal redress for equal pay, Title IX, Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and tenure denial violations. We allocate \$100,000 annually to help fund landmark cases, such as *Wal-Mart v. Dukes* and *Cioca v. Rumsfeld*, as well was cases with the potential to set future precedents like *Rizo v. Fresno County Office of Education*. National Equal Pay Day

Everyone knows that it's the 21st century! Isn't it time that modern humans finally set this women-aren't-paid -equally nonsense behind them and just give equal pay for equal work? That's what National Equal Pay Day is all about.

Throughout the last century, there has been an ongoing and active fight to solve a problem that has existed far longer than that. Ever since history and work began, women have been paid lower wages for doing the exact same job. And the gap gets even wider when women of color are considered in comparison to white men.

National Equal Pay Day encourages people to get out there and fight for true employment equality for everyone, no matter their gender or the color of their skin! Isn't it time people were paid what they are worth?

The next Equal Pay Day is Tuesday, March 15, 2022. This date symbolizes how far into the year women must work to earn what men earned in the previous year.

Help raise awareness about pay equity. One of the best ways to observe this day is by opening up conversations about the problems within this arena. Whether at work, in the neighborhood, or in an academic environment, it is important that men and women alike become more educated about this severe problem in society.
