Pay Equity, the Pandemic, and Latinas Jeanne Webdell

For the February branch president's meeting, Marsha Koch and I reviewed recent AAUW research concerning the wealth gap and the impact the pandemic has had on women.

One area that I looked at was the effect of the pandemic on Hispanic or Latina women. The 2021 report was titled *Pandemic Inequity – Latinas and the COVID-19 Experience*. The report showed the pandemic worsened the problems caused by the discrimination and poverty that are faced by the Latinx population every day.

Latinas account for 18% of the U.S. female population and are a critical base of support for the U.S. economy. For years Latinas have faced persistent and disproportionate experience with poverty. This is partially due to the fact that Latinas earn 55 cents for every dollar a white, non-Hispanic man makes. Adding to the wage gap problem are the factors of workplace discrimination and occupational segregation.

The pandemic has added to the socioeconomic disparities afflicting Latinas with exposure to the virus at work and in their families where multigenerational households added to the risk._The pandemic caused alarming disparities and inequalities particularly in the areas of infections, deaths and unemployment. Higher rates of coronavirus, deaths, unemployment, isolation, and food insecurity were among the inequities contributing to mental health issues, such as anxiety and depression.

AAUW researchers conducted 21 interviews. The women who were interviewed expressed appreciation about being able to talk about their feelings. One woman with the name Paola, who lived in California, shared - I have had so many jobs this past year. I worked the night shift

at a pistachio packing house. As employers go, this one was the best in terms of providing workers with protective equipment to help guard against the virus. In the beginning they weren't giving us anything; but then a worker got COVID, and they started providing masks and gloves. They enforced the rules, too.

Later I worked in the strawberry fields, where most of the workers were 60 or older and considered high risk. The field manager got COVID, and he continued working and interacting with workers. He never took any precautions, even after his wife died of the virus. I told him he should set the example and stay home, but he said he needed to earn money. It was very scary to work under those conditions. I wore a face mask and gloves and took extra masks to share with my co-workers.

When a company making Styrofoam boxes threatened to report me to the state's unemployment office if I did not accept a job from them, I had to take it. I didn't know at the time that this rule was not being enforced during the pandemic. It was a horrible place to work. My shift was from 12 am to 12 pm five days a week. They provided us with face masks, but the safety rules were loosely enforced. Many co-workers ended up getting the virus.

AAUW provides needed and timely research not just for members but for the community. The report on Latinas is an example of the importance of this research and the positive impact it can have by encouraging changes in our laws and communities.

The report recommends passage of legislation that will decrease the pay gap, provide educational opportunities, and offer child care and health care. AAUW supports bills such as the *Healthy Families Act, Family & Medical Insurance Leave Act, Paycheck Fairness Act*, and *Raise the Wage Act*.

Learn about Rung for Women, an organization uniquely focused on the economic advancement of women (https://rungforwomen.org/). Rung's intensive, individualized career training and support program helps women earning less than \$50,000 a year to climb the career ladder and become economically self-sufficient. Rung's strategy is to introduce women to careers that will offer them the opportunity to quickly achieve living-wage salaries. Recently Rung launched an initiative with Maryville University to create a Geospatial Analyst Training Program.

Two Rung leaders will talk about their approach to job training with integrated support services: **Lisa Weingarth**, vice president, institutional advancement, who oversees marketing and communications, development, volunteer management, and government affairs; and **Rhonda Gray**, vice president, strategy & innovation, who oversees the planning and implementation of Rung's strategy, development of new business models, and strategies for expansion.

March Lunch & Learn: Threats to the Initiative Petition Process

Missouri's initiative petition system has been in place for 115 years and allows citizens to put an issue on the ballot for a statewide vote. This critical tool, used through the years by citizens from all political persuasions is now under attack by lawmakers who want to curtail the people's power.

The legislature is currently proposing roughly 20 different bills that would make it harder to get an issue on the ballot and increase the threshold for an initiated measure to pass once on the ballot. For some perspective, a large majority of voters recently approved a higher minimum wage, Medicaid expansion, and medical marijuana through the initiative petition process. Under the proposed new threshold, each would have failed.

Ashton Kuehnel will present on why this is happening and what we can do about it. Ashton is a grassroots organizer with the Sierra Club, Missouri Chapter. Ashton has organized around Medicaid Expansion, a just transition to clean, renewable energy and voting protections. She lives in St. Louis City and is a Saint Louis University alum.

Orange Pecan Monkey Bread

Makes 8 to 10 servings. For a printable version of this recipe, please CLICK HERE.



Ingredients

- 1 cup firmly packed light brown sugar
- ½ cup granulated sugar
- 1½ teaspoons apple pie spice
- 1½ teaspoons orange zest
- 1/8 teaspoon kosher salt
- 2 (16.3-ounce) cans refrigerated biscuits,* each cut into 6 pieces
- ½ cup unsalted butter
- ½ cup fresh orange juice
- 3 tablespoons dark corn syrup
- ¼ cup heavy whipping cream
- 1½ teaspoons vanilla extract
- Garnish: chopped toasted Schermer Pecans

Instructions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°. Spray a 12- to 15-cup Bundt pan with cooking spray.
- 2. In a large bowl, stir together sugars, apple pie spice, zest, and salt. Add dough pieces, tossing to coat. Place dough pieces and any remaining sugar mixture in prepared pan.
- In a small saucepan, melt butter over medium heat. Remove from heat; stir in orange juice and corn syrup until combined. Stir in cream and vanilla. Pour over dough.
- 4. Bake until browned and bubbly, about 40 minutes. Spray a knife with cooking spray, and run around edges of pan. Place a plate over pan, and immediately invert bread onto plate. Garnish with pecans, if desired. Serve warm.
