Presidents' Message ...

At our November branch meeting, we discussed ways to get messages to our elected officials such as encouraging publication of the Equal Rights Amendment, supporting reproductive rights, and focusing on AAUW issues of public education, economic security, and equality. The collective voice of AAUW members is our strength.

One of our first efforts will be to send messages to the President to publish the ERA. An easy way to do this is to use

AAUW's 2-Minute Activist: https://www.aauw.org/act/two-minute-activist/era/.

Try it—it's quick and easy!

Links with talking points specific to each issue are listed on the 2-Minute Activist page. As an example, here is the message provided for the ERA:

As your constituent, I join with the American Association of University Women (AAUW) to urge you to support the Equal Rights Amendment. It's been 100 years since the ERA was first introduced in Congress, and a century is too long to wait!

I hope you will support the ERA by signing and supporting Discharge Petition No. 6, which would allow a vote in the U.S. House of Representatives on the bill to remove the timeline and recognize the ratification of the ERA (HJ Res 25).

Sex discrimination does not have the same legal protection as other constitutional classes, such as race, religion, or nationality. This constitutional double standard means that hard-won legislative and court victories against sex discrimination are not permanent—and can be rolled back or difficult to enforce.

The lack of constitutional equality reaches every aspect of women's lives. And a majority of Americans support the ERA, which has had bipartisan and multigenerational support for decades. It is past time we take action to ensure constitutional equality for all.

Women in the United States have waited long enough—Please sign the discharge petition and let HJ Res 25 come to the floor for a vote!

Thank you, and I look forward to your response.

January 14, 2025 Our Planet's Plastic Crisis


Dana Ripper, M.S.

There is growing awareness of the plastic crisis. amongst people around the world. What we previously thought of as simply unsightly, plastics - particularly single-use disposables - now pose serious climate, water, and air quality threat as well as being detrimental to human health. This presentation will consist of an in-depth discussion of our planet's plastic crisis. From the extraction of component materials to various manufacturing processes, to its end destination in human bodies, waterways, and incinerators, plastic is one issue that needs to be tackled immediately. We'll talk about the various points in plastic production and waste management where change can be made and how you can become involved in that change.



Dana Ripper is the Executive Director and Co-founder of the Missouri River Bird Observatory and a wildlife ecologist who focuses on conservation via ecosystem health. She has an MS in ecology from Arkansas State University

(2002) and worked on wildlife research projects across the U.S. before making Missouri home in 2008. In 2010, Dana co-founded the MRBO, a nonprofit organization dedicated to conservation via science, education, and advocacy. Since plastic production and waste mismanagement pose significant threats to climate stability, biotic and abiotic natural resources, and human health and quality of life, one of Dana's major emphases in her work with MRBO is systemic reduction in single-use plastics. MRBO is an affiliate organization of Break Free From Plastic and Beyond Plastics.









Access to clean water is essential for all aspects of society. As the climate changes and access to water becomes more uncertain, perceptions of water security may also change, leading to social, economic, and political instability, and even conflict. This conflict could be

addressed through cooperation, or, alternatively, result in the weaponization of water to oppress individuals or gain advantage over rivals. This lecture will explore water security in a changing climate and examine the implications of perceived declines in water security for society.

Jason Knouft is a Professor in the Biology Department at Saint Louis University and the Director of the Freshwater Policy Institute at the National Great Rivers Research and Education Center. He has served as a Climate and Water Security Analyst for the U.S. Department of State in the Bureau of Intelligence and Research (INR), an INR deputy representative to the Climate Security Advisory Council, an INR ex officio deputy representative to the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine's Climate Security Roundtable, a member of the National Advisory Council for Environmental Policy

and Technology at the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, and a Scientific Review Committee member at the National Socio-Environmental Synthesis Center. His research focuses on the investigation of freshwater system responses to environmental perturbations, with a particular interest in water security, climate change, contaminants, land use change, and adaptation strategies to address these issues. Knouft received a Ph.D. in biology from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign. Committee: Sue Williams, Kari Estes

Subject Matter Expertise: Historically, we have produced in-depth studies on topics like gender pay gap and women in leadership roles.
