- ♥ Why does the IBC need to raise funds? For IBC operating expenses and to support the International Relations Lecture Series in collaboration with the Tuesday Women's Association of the Ethical Society.

Voting Rights are Important

AAUW Missouri held its legislative retreat on Saturday February 24 via Zoom. 17 organizations participated by sharing legislation goals and priorities.

Among the most important issues facing Missouri residents is legislation affecting voters. Denise Lieberman of the Missouri Voter Protection Coalition highlighted the importance of some of this legislation including these bills:

- ⇒ **Restoration of voting rights to criminals** after completion of their sentence. *Empower Missouri* also supports this legislation that would automatically expunge records of crimes so that only police departments can see the records. Clean Slate HB 953 provides for a system to remove criminal records more easily. Now only 1% of the people apply for the removal of their record.
- ⇒ **Protection for Election workers**. HB507 establishes the offense of tampering with an election official, thereby creating protection for election workers.
- ⇒ **Protecting the Ballot Initiative Process.** This process is under attack by many legislators who want to limit the power of citizens to place initiatives on the ballot and maintain legislative control over the wording of the issues. Senate Bill 22 (SB22) now in the House limits challenges to summary statements. This bill is opposed by the LWV and MVPC.

Pecan Sales Fundraiser

A decades-long branch fundraiser has been sales of pecans from Schermer Pecans out of Georgia. Check with Kay Meyer if you need more. Here's a recipe you might like, Pecan Pimento Cheese.

- 1 pound sharp cheddar cheese, shredded
- 1 (8oz) package cream cheese, at room temperature
- ½ cup mayonnaise, or to taste
- 1-1½ teaspoons Tabasco
- 1 (7oz) jar diced pimentos, undrained
- 1 cup chopped pecans

Combine the cheddar and cream cheese in a food processor, pulsing to mix. Mix in the mayonnaise and Tabasco. Scrape into a mixing bowl and stir in the pimentos, their juice and the pecans. Refrigerate until ready to serve. Serve with crackers.

March 11, 2025 Modern Geopolitics: The Ghost of Sir John Mackinder K

Kevin Jon Fernlund, Ph.D.

Kevin Jon Fernlund is a Professor of History at the University of Missouri - St. Louis and is the author of Lyndon B. Johnson and Modern America (2009) and William Henry Holmes and the Rediscovery of the American West (2000). From 2001 to 2002, he was a Fulbright Scholar in Vietnam and between 2006 and 2012, he directed the Western History Association. His most recent book is A Big History of North America, from Montezuma to Monroe (2023).

Dr. Fernlund's presentation is "Donald Trump, America First, and the Ghost of Sir Halford John Mackinder, the Father of Modern Geopolitics," an evaluation of US foreign policy in the second Trump Administration.



Mackinder is often credited with introducing two new terms into the English language: "manpower" and "heartland." The Heartland Theory and more generally classical geopolitics and geostrategy were extremely influential in the making of US strategic policy during the period of the Cold War. Dr. Fernlund spoke earlier this year of how geography shapes global politics, echoing Paul Kennedy's insights on "how distance and terrain and climate affect the affairs of states and men."

April 8, 2025 Food Insecurity: Hunger and Famine Now, and in the Near Future Patricia Wolff, M.D.



Pediatrician Patricia Wolff founded the U.S. non-profit *Meds & Food for Kids (MFK)* in 2003 and served as Executive Director until 2020. Since its inception, MFK has saved the lives of almost 1,000,000 children seen in over 50 clinics in Haiti and with Haitian-made Ready to Use Therapeutic Food exported to 17

countries. The MFK approach is to use local labor and local resources to manufacture Medika Mamba, a treatment for malnutrition, which in turn develops the local economy.

For many years, Dr. Wolff spent half her time in Haiti to develop *Meds & Food for Kids*. She is a pediatrician, endocrinologist, and served as President of Forest Park

Pediatrics. Dr. Wolff's many awards include the St. Louis Women of Achievement (May 2017) and the St. Louis Bar Foundation Humanitarian Award (October 2015).

ACT NOW TO SUPPORT BIPARTISAN WOMEN'S HEALTH BILL

Last session, this critical women's health bill was just one vote from final passage; but despite wide bipartisan support - including from House leadership - this bill failed to pass due to dysfunction in the Missouri Senate. Both sides of the aisle strongly support this legislation that would treat and prevent disease, including congenital syphilis, increase access to contraception, and improve Missourians' health and wellbeing.
