Dr. Annie Valuska brings over 20 years of animal behavior experience to her role as a principal scientist on Purina's Pet Behavior team. After a variety of undergraduate research experiences at Kenyon College, Dr. Annie received her PhD in



Animal Behavior from the University of California, Davis, then went on to serve as the post-Doctoral behavior research fellow at Disney's Animal Kingdom. Since joining Purina in 2013, Dr. Annie has gotten to use her expertise to serve as the "voice of the pet," ensuring that the needs of cats and dogs are kept top of mind in all of Purina's products and outreach efforts. 

Maplewood–Richmond Heights High School is a leader of multiple service organizations. She is passionate in advocating for and spending time in our natural environment. Marlie is pursuing study and a career in environmental science and possibly forestry and is considering attending the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, or the University of Kentucky, Lexington.

Marlie is a member of the National Honor Society and Key Club and vice president of Student Council. She has been captain of both the girls' cross country and soccer teams. Marlie has participated in the SIFT program at Tyson Research Center and Shaw Nature Reserve. She has worked in customer service at the Brentwood and Steinberg Ice Rinks, Ces and Judy's catering, the Maplewood Aquatic Center, and as a volunteer at many community activities. She is serving an internship at the Shaw Institute for Field Training.

Marlie says she has always had an affinity for the outdoors: "I find I am at my happiest when I am outside, in nature. Whether I'm hiking, camping, running, or just looking on in awe at creation. Creation always stands to amaze me. It became apparent to me early on in high school that the importance of conserving nature increases, as environmental degradation increases day by day. I want to play a role in environmental conservation so natural beauty lasts.... Whatever track I end up landing in, it will allow me to do field research, lab work, and travel opportunities. Most importantly, I will work to serve the natural environment."

Eleanor Livengood from **Affton High School** had a childhood fascination with math and building that evolved into a passion for engineering and, ultimately, biomedical engineering. She plans to pursue this interest at Southern Illinois University–Carbondale this fall.

Eleanor has served on the Student Council for 4 years and is student body president. She is a member of the National Honor Society, works on the yearbook, and participates in TEAMS (tests of engineering aptitude mathematics and science) from TSA (technology student association) and a freshman mentoring program. She is on the girls' soccer team and is captain of the girls' swim team.

Eleanor was accepted into Missouri Scholars Academy for 2023. She received the St. Louis County 2024 Outstanding Student Leaders Award for Affton High School, as well as a Focus St. Louis leadership award and soccer team awards. Her volunteer work includes a teen addiction service project and the summer reading program and Reading Buddies at the St. Louis County Library. She has worked at Las Fuentas Mexican Restaurant and Midwest Pool Management.

Her interest in engineering comes from a simple moment, as she says: "In first grade, I was asked, 'What do you want to be when you grow up?' After less than a minute, I blurted out, 'Engineer.' Maybe I was thinking about how much I loved math class or playing with my older brother's forgotten Lego set." When she attended Missouri Scholars Academy, she realized she wanted to be a biomedical engineer, inspired by a speaker who was developing cancer vaccines.

March 11, 2025 Modern Geopolitics: The Ghost of Sir John Mackinder

Kevin Jon Fernlund, Ph.D.

Kevin Jon Fernlund is a Professor of History at the University of Missouri - St. Louis and is the author of Lyndon B. Johnson and Modern America (2009) and William Henry Holmes and the Rediscovery of the American West (2000). From 2001 to 2002, he was a Fulbright Scholar in Vietnam and between 2006 and 2012, he directed the Western History Association. His most recent book is A Big History of North America, from Montezuma to Monroe (2023).

Dr. Fernlund's presentation is "Donald Trump, America First, and the Ghost of Sir Halford John Mackinder, the Father of Modern Geopolitics," an evaluation of US foreign policy in the second Trump Administration.



Mackinder is often credited with introducing two new terms into the English language: "manpower" and "heartland." The Heartland Theory and more generally classical geopolitics and geostrategy were extremely influential in the making of US strategic policy during the period of the Cold War. Dr. Fernlund spoke earlier this year of how geography shapes global politics, echoing Paul Kennedy's insights on "how distance and terrain and climate affect the affairs of states and men."

Pediatrician Patricia Wolff founded the U.S. non-profit *Meds & Food for Kids (MFK)* in 2003 and served as Executive Director until 2020. Since its inception, MFK has saved the lives of almost 1,000,000 children seen in over 50 clinics in Haiti and with Haitian-

made Ready to Use Therapeutic Food exported to 17 countries. The MFK approach is to use local labor and local resources to manufacture Medika Mamba, a treatment for malnutrition, which in turn develops the local economy.

For many years, Dr. Wolff spent half her time in Haiti to develop *Meds & Food for Kids*. She is a pediatrician, endocrinologist, and served as President of Forest Park

Pediatrics. Dr. Wolff's many awards include the St. Louis Women of Achievement (May 2017) and the St. Louis Bar Foundation Humanitarian Award (October 2015).
